# **Totally Tomatoes!** By Sheila Barnes

We went all out this spring and decided to start our tomatoes from seed. Volunteer camper, Nancy Lemke, used her green thumb and patient care to get these little buggers going. I ordered seeds in January, almost all heirloom varieties, and she had them sprouted in no time.

By mid March they were ready to go in the ground, and we had to hope the weather would cooperate. It did, and we only had to cover them twice with the moderate cold fronts that came through.

There are over 55 tomato plants now thriving, and they include Yellow Pear, Heirloom Cherry, Rutgers, Mr. Stripey, and Brandywine. We also put in a row of Beefsteaks, just for fun.

Our potatoes and onions from winter are almost ready to harvest, while the green & wax beans, pole beans, cucumber, summer squashes, eggplant and pepper plants are showing promise.

Nancy also started flowers from seed and we have zinnias and cosmos already in bloom. The rest of the flower bed is particularly pretty this year, with snapdrag-ons, volunteer nasturtiums, and coreopsis.

Hard as it can be to grow stuff in our Florida sand, at least for now there appears to be a good garden in the making. Thanks to all our volunteers and staff for putting in the sweat equity to try to make our garden grow!

# **Randy Roosters**

But being a public park does dictate safety issues for visitors. So we did have to "relocate" our fine Dixie Rainbow rooster this week. We hope that someone finds him to be perfect for their farm. Meanwhile, his hens are a tad confused when being put up for the night without his guidance, and as they define their new pecking order. It will all even out as spring dissolves into summer...and the mating season ends. Such is life on MKR'S farm.
