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President's Message

Looking Forward Looking Back



2019 was an eventful year for the Friends of the Marjorie Kinnan Rawlings Farm. In October we held our most ambitious event, a presentation of Deborah Dickey's *Cross Roads: Marjorie Kinnan Rawlings and Norton S. Baskin in Unguarded Moments*. What a wonderful reception and play! Thanks to all who made the event possible.

December marked our extremely successful Friends' Annual Meeting at the park with a fascinating presentation by board member Donna Green-Townsend. The presentation was an obvious labor of love, detailing Donna's years at the Creek and her neighbors there. A lovely evening holiday celebration followed just a week later.

That event reminded me of Marjorie's description of winter at the farm. Winter was the beginning of the hunting season, of which Rawlings was ambivalent, and of the fear of frost, which could be devastating to her orange groves. Her description in *Cross Creek* of freezing nights and the resulting "firing on a freeze" are compelling. As she wrote: "There is a healthy challenge in danger and a certain spiritual sustenance comes from fighting it. I would not choose to have lived without knowing the nights of firing on a freeze." Indeed, she wrote of the fires set in the grove to fight the effects of the freeze: "I have seen no more beautiful thing in my life than my orange grove by night, lighted by fatwood fires. It is doubly beautiful for the danger and the struggle, like a beloved friend for whose life one battles, drinking in the well known features that may be taken away forever." She wisely continued:

The round golden oranges are each lit with a secret inner candle.
My heart bursts with the loveliness of the grove and of the night.
If only, I think, I could watch such beauty unencumbered by my fears. Then I know that a part of the beauty is the fight to keep it, and that all good things do not come too easily and must perpetually be fought for. Our test is in our recognition of our love and our willingness to do battle for it.

In *Cross Creek*, fires that created beauty were indicative of danger, and Christmas was described as a muted event. At our holiday event the fires did not represent danger, nor was the holiday celebration muted. It was a memorable event celebrating the beauty of the season as well as the continued viability of Marjorie's home at the Creek.

More events are coming. In November the Writer's Talks series began with great success. A talk in January and one in February are planned. In addition Mimi Carr as Marjorie will be at the park on January 26. And Anne Pierce's annual Scrub Walk is scheduled for March 7. Please see the articles about these events in this newsletter.

At long last, Winter is Here . . . and as Marjorie wrote in *Cross Creek*: “Ahead of us is the good season, when growth is slowed and a very little hoeing keeps clean the farm fields, the groves and the gardens. It is the tidy time. The lush exuberance of summer is forgotten and the hurricanes of the fall. All is neat and ordered.”

The Christmas season has always been an exciting time at the Farm and this year was no exception. Ranger Geoff Gates and Tour Guide Sheila Holloway ventured out deep into the scrub of the Ocala National Forest, with permit in hand, to pick out not one but two sand pine Christmas trees: one for the farmhouse, and this year, one for the tenant house. After miles of driving to the point of feeling lost in the scrub, not far from the location Marjorie wrote about in *The Yearling*, they came upon the designated cutting area, a sea of sand pines as thick as dog hair. That’s when the hunt began.



This one’s too big . . . this one’s too small . . . Finally, this one is just right! Hopefully you were able to come out for the Holiday Open House.

Speaking of our Holiday Open House -- what a tremendous turnout we had. Over 450 visitors made the walk up the candlelit path, past the bounty of holiday refreshments and carolers, through the lamplit and decorated farmhouse and finally out the south porch where music filled the air. This year we lit a path to the tenant house so visitors could get a peek

at it before heading out. What a special time of year it is. We are thankful for everyone that helped put it on and for those that came out to enjoy this most festive event. Special thanks to the Cross Creek Baptist Church Carolers, musicians Lee Townsend and Jesse Armstrong and the Front Porch Back Steppers for providing the music for the evening.

Mimi Carr to Portray Rawlings January 26, 2020

Mimi Carr will portray Marjorie Kinnan Rawlings on Sunday, January 26, 2020 from 4 to 5 pm at the Marjorie Kinnan Rawlings Historic State Park. This is part of the Sunshine State Book Festival's Literary Tour featuring famous writers that lived in Gainesville and the surrounding area. Carr, born in Gainesville and raised next to the Wewa Pond near Micahopy, says she learned from her parents at an early age to love the writings of Marjorie Kinnan Rawlings. After several years of working as an actress in regional theaters around the country, Carr returned to Gainesville, where she does readings of works by Rawlings. This has been both thrilling and edifying, she says, citing in particular Rawlings' short stories, her book *Cross Creek*, and letters to Maxwell Perkins, her editor at Scribner's.

Yearling Trail Walk Saturday, March 7, 2020

The Friends of the Marjorie Kinnan Rawlings Farm, Inc., will sponsor a guided walk of a portion of the Yearling Trail in the Ocala National Forest on Saturday, March 7. Anne Pierce will read passages from *The Yearling* and tell the story of the Long family in the Big Scrub. The walk is a 3-mile loop trail that includes the sinkhole mentioned in the Rawlings novel. The area is rather flat through a mostly pine forest, and the trail is well maintained but sandy in places.

A reservation is required. Call the Park Farmhouse (352-466-3672) by Friday, February 28, 2020, leaving your name, number in your party, and a contact number; please indicate where you will meet us (Cross Creek or Silver Glenn Springs). The group will meet at the Rawlings County Park adjacent to the MKR Historic State Park in Cross Creek at 8:15 am to carpool to the trail. If you live over that way, you may meet us at the Silver Glenn Springs parking lot at 9:30 am.

Please don't plan to bring children younger than twelve or dogs with you. You might consider wearing closed shoes that allow you to walk a sandy or woody trail, sun protection including a hat, water for the trail, and lunch or snacks. We hope to be on the trail by 10:00 am and back to the cars by about 1:00. Since we will be near Silver Glenn Springs, we will lunch at the springs (\$5.50 admission), and walk the "boils" trail (about 1 mile) with another reading from *The Yearling*. We hope you come on this part of the adventure to enjoy your picnic lunch and even a swim if you don't mind the cold water.

For the last two years, we have not been able to get into the Juniper Wilderness Area that contains the Yearling Trail because of closure due to bear activity. Last year we hiked another trail along the Salt Springs Run. We will consider some alternative trail this year if necessary. For this reason, it is very important to have a good contact phone number to contact you at the last minute.



An Appreciation: Carol Fiddia Laxton

Carol Fiddia Laxton was a natural storyteller. Likely she inherited it from her father, Leonard Fiddia. She shared this gift in my recent documentary, “Here Is Home: Marjorie Kinnan Rawlings and Cross Creek.”

Born near Fort McCoy, Florida, in 1934, she died there in May of 2019 at age 85, surrounded by her children and grandchildren.

Over the past couple years, I came to know and deeply appreciate Carol. We often traded letters and phone calls, just catching up. I was proud to introduce her to the crowd at the premiere of our documentary in Gainesville last fall. The next morning, we took a boat ride up the Ocklawaha River, thanks to Anne Pierce, to visit Fiddia’s Landing. Carol hadn’t been on the river in decades, she said, though she drove across its high bridge every time she went to town. She recalled her dad’s boats drawn up on the river banks.

In 2017, I had the privilege of recording Carol’s bright memories of Marjorie Kinnan Rawlings, the Fiddia family’s longtime friend. She knew her as “Marj,” which is how her dad referred to the famous author. In 1930, Rawlings lived with Leonard and his mother, Piety, for two months while researching her novel *South Moon Under*, set in the Big Scrub. Leonard was the prototype for Lant, the protagonist. Rawlings took care to describe Lant, who made moonshine, very differently from Leonard, who made moonshine in real life. She didn’t want to get him in trouble with the Marion County law, Carol said.

Carol grew up on the old home place with her parents, Leonard and Margaret, her younger brother, Elmer, her younger sister, Grace, and her grandmother, Piety, in the Ocala National Forest. Rawlings wrote about a visit with the Fiddias in a May 14, 1946 letter to her friend, Norman Berg:

The Fiddia family was having supper in the twilight kitchen of the cabin, old Miss Piety eating biscuits and honey with the slowness of age, Leonard talking of the bear that is eating all his hogs and he can’t take time to lay for him, his wife quiet, ladling out beans and venison on the children’s plates when she saw them empty, and the three children as lovely as flowers. The baby, Gracie, and I fell in love, and she clung to me, and a little black kitten kept patting her bare toes with its soft paws. Moe (Rawlings’s dog), of course, peeking in the door from the breezeway, wanting to come in, too.

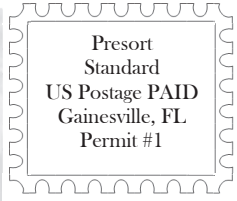
