The Friends are working with the Marjorie Kinnan Rawlings Society, UF's George A. Smathers Libraries and the Matheson Museum in Gainesville to launch a series of events here in the North Central Florida area to celebrate the 75th anniversary of the publication of *The Yearling*.

The first printing was issued on April 1, 1938, and the novel was awarded the Pulitzer Prize in April of 1939. We are proclaiming "The Year of *The Yearling*: Celebrating a Literary Classic," and we will offer a number of events open to the public to help us follow the trajectory of the novel from "publication to Pulitzer." Scrub Trip 2013 Saturday, March 2

We are sponsoring a guided walk of a portion of the Yearling Trail in the Ocala National Forest on Saturday, March 10, 2013. Anne Pierce will read passages from *The Yearling* and tell the story of the Long Family's residence in the "Big Scrub" from the late 1800's.

The walk is a 3 mile loop that includes the sink hole mentioned in the novel. The trail is mostly flat and is well maintained but sandy and hilly in places.

We'll meet at the Rawlings County Park adjacent to the MKR House in Cross Creek at 8:15 AM to carpool to the trail. You will need to wear sturdy closed shoes, have sun protection including a hat, and carry water for the trail. Bring lunch and snacks, as no food or water will be provided during the excursion. There are no restroom facilities until we reach Silver Glen Springs. We will be on the Yearling trail by 10:00 AM and back to our cars by 1:00 PM..

We will also visit Silver Glen Springs, to see the "boils" and do another reading from *The Yearling*.


“Chidlings” The Mystery Word.

It was 1931 before anything Marjorie Rawlings had been sending to potential publishers hit pay dirt (and not a minute too soon). It was a short story titled “Cracker Chidlings” which contained eight separate sketches based on

local Cracker people and events she had learned about. It was her first story about Crackers and Scribner's Magazine was the buyer.


The title of her story drew our interest. Crackers we know about, but who or what are



Chidlings? There is no etymology for the word and it is not used in the story. Could it be a local derivative of chitterlings commonly known as chitlins? These words can be found in the dictionary and are defined as pork, and sometimes beef, small intestines prepared as food. But Rawlings was known for her precision in writing and enormous vocabulary so it is difficult to write the word off as some kind of mistake. On the other hand there was no way to verify its meaning or usage. It was a mystery.

One of the joys of reading Rawlings' stories is stumbling across a usage or a reference that explains something totally far afield of what you are reading. Such was the discovery of “chidlings” being used in two unrelated stories.

Rereading “Jacob's Ladder” recently (her second published piece) we came across “chidlings” used in a specific context. If you recall late in the story, Mart and Florry were done in when the storekeeper took Mart's traps in payment for the debt he ran up at the store. The loss of the traps seemed to break Mart, he lost his characteristic fearlessness and optimism. Florry thinks to herself “He's like to had the chidlin's beat out of him.” It was his courage that was beat out of him, or swagger if you will.



In “Lord Bill of the Suwannee River” Rawlings is describing the massive and imposing Bill Boyle who was larger than life and feared by all men. But she does concede that “Here and there a man had the chidlings to cross him” setting up the story of an epic battle. The word “chidlings” became a clear euphemism for courage or other more earthy terms.

Thank you Marjorie for revealing the definition of the word you chose for the title for your first published work at Cross Creek. It is also significant that she chose to characterize Crackers for their courage in her very first piece written about them, even if we didn't understand what she meant right away.

We couldn’t be more grateful for the help our volunteer campers provide. The question that remains is: how did we ever manage without them?





